




71st Infantry Brigade





158th Infantry Brigade




Infantry Battalions are the 1/5 Welch Rtg, the 1st East Lancashire, and the 7th Royal Welch Fusiliers.

160th Infantry Brigade




Infantry Battalions are the 2nd Monmouthshire. the 4th Welch, and the 6th Royal Welch Fusiliers.



The 53rd was mobilized on September 1, 1940 on the same day Germany invaded Poland as a 2nd Line division, duplicated from the 38th Welsh Division. After the fall of France, the division was sent to protect Northern Ireland from German invasion. In 1942, the 53rd was sent to southern England and on June 28, 1944, it was finally sent overseas to Normandy. The 53rd was heavily engaged in the fighting in France, suffering almost 4000 casualties by the end of August.

After the advance across France, the division was involved in Market-Garden as part of the XII Corps attack on the left flank of the advance.
